classes with each other. These bounds are formed during joint activities like the Walkathon and the Spring Gala, but also during meetings of the class representatives and people sharing the same classes.




MAXIMA KRAGE (7L): When I moved to Linz two years ago, going to an international school was the highlight of moving away from my hometown. Now

Interview with **Mrs. Foulkes-Jones**

For this LISA4U edition, Mrs Foulkes-Jones, a new member of the LISA Team, responsible for taking care of the LISA library and additionally for tutoring English, agreed to be interviewed on all that we are curious to know about – thanks a lot for your time!

LISA4U: Where would you consider your roots to be and which place signifies home for you?

Mrs. Foulkes-Jones: My roots are Austrian, but as I moved to the UK and some of my "growing up" happened there, I feel like there is a little bit of "Britishness" in the way I am and how I feel.

However, home for me is being with my family, no matter where that is. We have recently moved into a new house and it's only slowly starting to feel like 'home' – However, I feel the most at home when I am with my family on a rainy Sunday and we watch a movie, play some board games or do crafts together.

LISA4U: What are your hobbies?

Fabio: Yeah, I agree, and I also think that my friends will help me go through the more stressful times. Emil and Jakob are two of my best friends here and we're really having a good time together.





LISA subjects

Don't you ever wonder why people do what they do? With the Psychology IB course you can discover fundamental behavior and learn how the brain works, how we behave as individuals in society and how your thought processes influence what you do.

n the IB Psychology course you learn to consider behavior from 3 different perspectives. First of all, there is the biological approach which studies our behavior from the anatomical or more "bodilv" point of view. Here you learn which techniques you can use to study our brains – and it isn't that simple, especially when you want to find out which parts of the brain you need for certain functions or actions. After all, unless you want to cut out parts of the brain of thousands of people to study how their behavior has changed, psychologists have found other (non-brutal!!) ways of studying the human brain. In the course you will also find out about the cause of those annoying pu-You berty-mood swinas. guessed it, hormones. Hormones and neurotransmitters (chemicals that transfer signals from tiny parts of your brain to others) are those little evil doers. However, you will also learn about how hormones make you feel love and closeness to your loved ones.

A different perspective is the cognitive approach, which studies what happens in your head. Trying to find out about thoughts, memories and decision-making is kind of hard, considering that you cannot see, smell or touch any of these processes. Yet, in the



course, you will learn to understand studies that investigate all those aspects of psychology. You will find out how researchers test for how only a few words in a question can change the way you answer it, how many different thoughts you can hold in your brain at the same time and how your emotions change your thoughts and behavior.

The third and final approach is the sociocultural one that investigates how you and I coexist in this society. You will find out how culture and our group thinking can be researched in an empirical way. An example for that is a study by Festinger (1956) that wants to find out how people react when they find out that the theory of the cult they have been a part of, turns out to be wrong. The course will explore why people conform, or said in different words, why you feel the urge to follow the trends your fave influencers are trying out too (because let's admit it - we all do sometimes).

IB psychology is a class that will not only teach you to understand studies and factual information about our behavior, it also trains your critical thinking skills. Find out about the scientific method and how to apply it to human behavior, how to connect the dots and how to understand academic writing. You even get to replicate a study for your Internal Assessment!

Overall, learning psychology with the IB is a great opportunity to see human behavior from a multidisciplinary point of view and understanding the science as a discipline.

For the past few decades many in western society considered democracy as the benevolent savior, freeing us of the strutting dictators of 20th century Europe, but how long

will our newfound freedom last in a digitalized society? With the rise of



social media across the world some may wonder how our highly digitalized society impacts modern democratic thought.

Fake news and propaganda have been around for centuries, but never before have they had such a profound influence on voting habits. You would think that a political system that relies on an informed population would thrive in a digital world, right? Well, not guite. While social media and the internet have had some notable benefits in terms of awareness about spreading various issues, this is clearly outweighed by the disinformation that seeps out of our phone screen and into the political reality. Various studies have shown that conspiracy theories and fake news are widely popular on social media platforms such as twitter and have had a noticeable effect on voting in the US. This mass misinformation of the public is largely to blame for the democratic erosion we face today.

Some have even gone as far as stating that we live in a 'Twitterocracy' – a world gov-

> erned by snappy headlines, parasocial relationships and abundance of fake

news. This analysis portrays the increasing importance of social media in national elections. In fact, it has become clear that a political candidate does not stand a change without an active social media account. It also portrays a dramatic shift in how news is consumed nowadays - people tend to favor short, polarizing headlines with a palpable message to long and impartial pieces. This works in the favor of many politicians, who like reality stars bask in the limelight of their flagrant twitter threads and exaggerated comments. Left in the shadows remains a people so unceremoniously choked by the hands of dubious fake news campaigns that one could hardly call it democracy.

This sensationalized attitude towards media has been especially fruitful for right wing populists – borderline fascist movements across the globe have been successfully amplified, with their voices reaching both young and old, poor, and rich. No one is immune to their convincing rhetoric. This is especially harmful as the majority of such groups promote authoritarian ideals and antidemocratic sentiment. The infamous capitol riots, for instance, are a symptom of the brazen refusal to accept democratic elections that will rade on as long as such populist movements remain unregulated. These attacks, brought about by he who shall not be named, are a case study of how a single man and his cult-like group of supporters can topple democracy in one fell swoop. Well, almost at least. The darkly insidious nature of such instances highlights the fragility of our political system in the face of social media and the internet, leaving us to wonder: are the capitol attacks a sign of worse to come?

Unfortunately, yes. As pessimistic as my answer may be, we must recognize that the capitol riots were merely a dress rehearsal for the fate of democracy in the western world. Prepare the history books because the strutting dictators of the 21st century are ready to unfurl.


