Recipes

Pumpkin Spice Cookies

A utumn is a time where the leaves turn colorful, the air gets chilly and there are lots of pumpkins. For this reason I thought that I would share a delicious pumpkin spice cookie recipe to fill up that craving for cookies everyone gets from time to time. I chose this recipe in particular because I found it to be very simple but still delicious. Even if you know very little about baking, like me, you can easily bake these cookies to satisfy you and anyone else you want to share with. These cookies are a perfect gift for anyone, and are a great addition to your autumn menu, so even if this doesn't sound like something you would typically like I definitely recommend trying them out first.

Ingredients:

- 2 and ½ cups of all-purpose flour ¾ cup brown sugar ½ cup granulated sugar 2 teaspoons cornstarch 1 large egg ½ teaspoon tartar 2 teaspoons vanilla
- ³⁄₄ teaspoon baking soda
- ½ cup canned pumpkin
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Instructions:

- 1. The first step to any cookie recipe is to make the batter so we will start by taking two bowls to mix our ingredients in.
- 2. In the first bowl you want to whisk the flour, cornstarch, cream of tartar, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and ground cloves.
- 3. Then in the second bowl, you beat the butter and sugars until they are fluffy. Once they are nice and fluffy, turn the mixer on low and add the egg, pumpkin and vanilla.
- Next you want to slowly add the flour mixture into the second bowl. This should result in a very sticky mixture.
- 5. Once you've done that you can cover the bowl with a plastic film and put it in the refrigerator for at least 2 hours.
- When you are ready to bake, you can preheat the oven to 175°C.
- 7. You should take about 1 and ½ teaspoons worth of dough, and roll it into a ball. Then flatten it slightly before placing it on the baking paper. Remember, you should at least leave 2 inches or so between the cookies so that they have space to move.
- Finally you should bake the cookies for about 10 minutes or until the top of the cookies look set.



In conclusion these cookies are the perfect snack for any movie, and are something that everyone enjoys making them perfect as gifts. I strongly recommend anyone reading this to at least try this recipe once, even if you don't usually love baking, as it can be a great bonding activity to do with loved ones.

Sports are an important part of school life. In many countries, a lot of time and effort is put into school sports - so much time that universities give out scholarships to those with outstanding athletic performance. In Austria, universities focus on academic achievement and don't give as much attention to other factors such as athletic ability. Although Austria may not value this as much, our school is making some steps towards changing this.

C limbing is one of the sports that the school offers this year. It started on the 3rd of October and lasts until March. Classes take place on

Thursdays from 14:00 to 16:00. A maximum of 12 students from the lower grades are allowed to participate. The group of participants meets in the school's gym, and they walk to the climbing center nearby. In this activity, students learn climbing techniques such as bouldering and top rope climbing. Additionally, they also find out how to properly use climb-

ing equipment. Using the climbing center costs 3 Euros for every session and climbing shoes can be rented at 50 Cents for every session.

Not a fan of climbing? No problem! Volleyball is another sport activity at the school. It lasts from the 3rd of October until the end of April. Students from 2nd to 4th class can participate in lessons on Thursdays from 14:15 to 15:45. This school sport takes place on school grounds, either indoors or outdoors. In this activity, students can improve their volleyball skills and their teamwork, as well as learn how to play according to official volleyball



rules. Some talented and motivated students may even get the chance to represent the school in small competitions.

Volleyball is too boring for you? Don't worry, the school also has football classes for those who want an actual challenge. Students from the first and second classes can sign up for classes that take place on Thursdays from 14:00 to 15:30. The activi-

ty starts on the 3rd of October and ends in April as well. The goal of this extracurricular activity is to improve the football skills of the students, learn how to play in a team, as well as understand and play according to official game rules. Besides that, there is also the "Schülerliga" in which students can compete on local and national terms. This competition consists of three games in Autumn and three games in early 2023, where about 18 students will play against other

schools. If they perform well in this tournament, they might even qualify for the Austrian Nationals in Salzburg.

To conclude, extracurricular sports at the school have gained in significance for many students this year. In the future, we hope to see new faces participating in these activities!

The Secret History

The Secret History by Donna Tartt follows Richard, the protagonist, in a retelling of his college years. One year in particular at Hampden college left a lasting imprint in his memory, as it was filled with curious characters and an unspeakable act.

n the first line of Donna Tartt's 'The Secret History' their crime is revealed by the words: " The snow in the mountains was melting and Bunny had been dead for several weeks before we came to understand the gravity of our situation. " Richard looks back on the friends he had made and tries to make sense of the events that lead to the killing of a fellow classmate, no, friend. He begins by recounting his arrival at the school and his struggle to get there due to his poor, abusive father. Financial aid and his wits secure his admission into the college.

Once there he enrolls in his desired courses but is intrigued by the Greek classics

course offered the college. He enjoyed studying Greek for two years in his hometown Plano, California, and is eager to deepen his knowledge on the subject. This course reveals itself to be taught by a man named Julian Morrow. Julian is portrayed very positively by Richards' narration. He represents the jovial, wise father figure who Richard always wished he had growing up.

It is hard for Richard to get into the classics course however. The revered Mr Morrow is later accused by a student of only 'picking the best chocolates out of the box'. This accusation

stems from the fact that the professor hand-picks his students. Furthermore, he refuses to teach anyone other than his selected students. Making his class very small, so small, that it only consist of five students. Richard is intrigued by these five students and admires their dynamic and aesthetics from afar. The broad shouldered, collected , calculating Henry Winter, the delicately angelic twins Charles and Camilla Macaulay, the long fingered red haired Francis Abernathy and finally, Bunny Corcoran. Bunny's full name is Edmund Corcoran. He comes from a wealthy family and sports a loud, cheery demeanor which makes him likable.

As luck has it, Richard manages to wangle an invitation into

the Classics class by aiding some of Julian's students with their Greek homework. He soon finds himself in Mr Morrow's office discussing his integration into the course. He is forewarned however, that entering the class will lead to a profound distance from the rest of the school. Richard ends up accepting the spot offered to him which ultimately leads to him playing a part in his classmates murder.

Before chaos breaks loose, and Richard learns his classmates secrets he enjoys weekends in the countryside, wine, dinners,

academics cigarettes and alongside the five Greek classics students. Up until winter break all is well but it is then that Richard realizes that the others have been sneaking around him the entire semester. Personally I find this book to be beautifully written, especially Donna's way of portraying Richards' view of the world. He himself is a morally gray character who deludes himself into seeing only the things he wishes to see. Through her writing one is provoked into thinking about topics that challenge ones own morals and address the deception of appearance. These themes are highlighted by the characters Richard encounters in his studies. The characters presented in the story are complex and startlingly real, made evident by the fact that it is possible to like and dislike them all at once.

It is one of the best books I have read and I would recommend it to anyone who is interest has been awakened by my short introduction into the plot.

20-minute call that inspired the original movie, a kidnapped woman spoke to a 911 operator in code while sitting next to her abductor. This movie's world premiere took place at the 2021 Toronto International Film Festival on September 11, 2021.

Police officer Joe Baylor is transferred to the switchboard after an on-duty incident. While awaiting trial, he works in an emergency call center against his will. During a night shift, he gets a call from a woman named Emily, claiming to have been kidnapped in a van. She appears to be in great danger, traveling in a car in the company of a man unwillingly. Emily is calling 911, pretending to speak to her daughter, while Joe wants to help and sends his colleagues to look for it. Joe tries to keep her on the phone, but things keep going wrong. When a murder finally comes to light, Joe has to realize that nothing is as it seems.

Visual Arts Excursion to Vienna

M s. Weiss and Ms. Milton organized a field trip on the 20th September to Vienna, Austria for their 11th-grade art class. On that Tuesday, the students were instructed to meet the teachers at the main train station in Linz, and 12 students showed up. After an hour's trip, on the tram and train, they finally made it to Vienna.

The group's first stop was the museum "The Albertina Modern". The exhibition

"The Face", is a collection of modern portrait photography from the Museum that was on display as part of the exhibition. These photos, which were created by both foreign and Austrian artists, demonstrate how versatile portraiture can be. They range from moving studies of well-known figures to images of artists working in their studios to projects that span entire series of images that examine the subjects' environment.

The images on display address issues including cultural identity, interpersonal connections, and a variety of life experiences, as well as queries about peoples' ancestry and true selves. The collection features pieces by Chuck Close, Gottfried Helnwein, Richard Avedon, Nancy Lee Katz, and Franz Hubmann.

Later that day the students walked to the most significant, diverse, and organized design event in Austria, Vienna Design Week. This event goes beyond the focus on product design, it also raises the issue of what contribution designers' work makes to global and local life. The students attended a range of activities in the disciplines of industrial, graphic and product design, as well as architecture and crafts. After the class left the event, they were allowed to explore Vienna's 12th district before they left to go back home.

I staggered out of the mist. "Anyone call me?


Breakfast already?"

Slowly, my vision went black.



After decades of teaching and working as part of the administrative staff, two of the four share their initial motivation(s) to become an educator and fill us in on their retirement plans.



Mr. Franz Rammer

A fter more than four decades, 41 years to be exact, Mr. Rammer Franz, a teacher and administrative staff member is retiring. His dream job as an adolescent was to become a professional athlete, yet somehow, he ended up as an unforgettable part of our "Europagymnasium Auhof Family". Mr. Rammer studied Geography, Sports, and Business Administration and taught the prior, except the latter, IT, and extracurricular activities such as the "Unternehmer-führerschein" for years.

LISA4U: Why did you decide to become a teacher?

Mr. Rammer After graduating and completing my Austrian Final Exams, I thought about what job I would like to take up and where I have certain inclinations. I was very talented in Sports, so studying Sports was clear to me. As a second subject, I decided to study Geography - as I was most interested in Geography, so to speak. It was out of interest, out of professional interest, that I studied it. At that time, it was the case that this professional interest filled a gap and fit perfectly for becoming a teacher.

LISA4U: Rather than becoming a teacher, what else was your dream?

Mr. Rammer "My dream job was to have the ability to get creative, to implement something in the operational and management areas - that's why I chose my second degree.

He documented this achievement in the annual school report and outlined how gym class and to what extent I were able to aid in his weight loss and getting-healthier process.

Mr. Rammer The biggest challenge is to encourage and enable a good classroom atmosphere, teach calmly, create a learning environment and foster teaching with the possibility of healthy development. Above all, not to put the funnel on the students and say: Study this, no excuses! So, to offer the students an opportunity to go through development. And the most important thing is to never hold the students against any subject and demotivate them, so they never want to retake it.

LISA4U: What advice would you give to younger colleagues and students?

Mr. Rammer The only advice I can give to my

colleagues is that they have to find their way of teaching and work on attaining appreciation in the classroom, thereby treating the students fairly. Regarding students, I wish that the students would treat each other and their teachers with respect and that they would be able to learn a lot in a good teaching environment during their eight years at the Europagymnasium.

LISA4U: What word/phrase would you use to describe your time at the Europagymnasium Auhof?

Mr. Rammer "Ich habe viel gelernt und Einiges bewegt! ("I learned and moved/initiated a lot!")"

Thanksgiving Dinner Recipe

Thanksgiving is a holiday celebrated in the USA during Autumn. To celebrate some of the American culture, or maybe just to have a wonderful meal, you could try to follow this recipe that has been brought down by my family's tradition for years! When eating this, I recommend inviting A LOT of people, unless you want to eat leftovers for two months!

Chicken/Turkey Stuffing

C ut up an onion, celery and plenty of carrots. Then take 1/2 kg of ground pork and some of the vegetables that you cut (chopped onion and celery), add the roast Mary spice, and stuff the inside of the Turkey with it. Any extra cut vegetables should go into the roaster. Then, add two cans of cream of chicken soup and more roast Mary spice to the chicken.

When putting in stuffing, put the pork in the cavity of Turkey/chicken. Add items under and celery, onion, and carrots under meat. Pour the cream of chicken soup with NO water added over the chicken. Sprinkle more roast Mary over it. Put in a meat thermometer and cover it. Place the

turkey into a heated oven and not on a flat pan. It keeps the moisture in the turkey.

Then roast the turkey at 176°C for about 2-3 hours. Use the meat thermometer to check when it is done. Use a big spoon to baste the turkey with the gravy about every hour. You can also know it is ready when you can smell the turkey and when the meat easily breaks off when you test it.

Cauliflower

Boil the entire cauliflower in one piece until soft. When boiling the cauliflower, put in half a stick of celery to absorb the smell of cauliflower. Remove the cauliflower from the water and put it in a glass baking dish. Pour a few tablespoons of



melted butter over it and then shake and bake. Bake for 15 minutes at 170°C. Then, sprinkle the shake and bake and drizzle some melted butter on top and bake about 15 minutes in 185°C oven

Yams - Sweet potatoes deluxe

To six potatoes add ½ cup drained crushed pineapple or ½ cup chopped pecan nut meats. Put in a buttered baking dish. Dot with marshmallows. Bake at 190°C until the marshmallows melt and brown.

Turkey Salad Dressing

You need the following ingredients:

- Yogurt salad dressing
- Plain yogurt 3 tablespoons
- 5 tablespoons of vinegar
- Olive oil 3 tablespoons
- Pepper sea salt
- Sugar a pinch brown
- Walnuts






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Walkathon
