Cosmopolitanism

Our school branch has a strong school community. Both Austrian and international students pursue the goal of personal growth through education.

Around a quarter of our students come from all over the world. Respectful interaction with other opinions and cultures is taught and also lived. Thanks to our international orientation, diversity and internationality, we convey a cosmopolitan outlook. The knowledge that one's language, culture or worldview is often just one of many promotes a cosmopolitan way of thinking.

Our students with a different mother tongue learn German as a foreign language in lessons that correspond to their language level.

Bilingualism

We are an international English immersion school. An excellent education in English prepares your child for a globalised world. Elementary school students with German as their mother tongue do not need any previous knowledge of English, as Grades 5 and 6 (Years 1 and 2) are taught in English and German. Those who do not speak any German will receive a German course which is appropriate to their level.

Personality Development

Education is more than just passing on knowledge. Our goal is to foster inquisitive, educated and empathic young people who work for a better world through international understanding and respect. Students should develop into strong and mature personalities. Personality development cannot simply be "taught". We have a supportive school culture and guide our students through this important development phase of their lives. Stage play (Drama) is offered from Grade 5 (Year 1) onwards. Even our youngest learn to present themselves on stage and thus strengthen their self-confidence. In addition, they expand their vocabulary and their expression.

Quality Education

We respect students' views and interests. Students at LISA can learn up to four languages and opt for e.g., drama or choir starting Grade 9. For the last two years, as part of the IB Diploma Programme, students can choose elective subjects according to their interests. The CAS (Creativity Activity Service) programme enables students to gain new experiences and broaden their horizons.

Strong School Community

At the LISA, we pride ourselves in creating a warm and inclusive atmosphere for our students. Our community is made up of pupils from all corners of the world, who speak over 30 different languages. We believe that mutual respect and tolerance, paired with a strong academic environment, are key to fostering a positive and supportive school community.

Matura and the IB Diploma

Pupils with German as their mother tongue can complete the Austrian school leaving examination (Matura) and the IB Diploma. Our international students complete the LISA with the IB Diploma and can continue their studies in Austria or abroad.

We would like to welcome you to our school on behalf of our entire school community. It is a great pleasure to introduce the LISA to you!

A caring, multicultural and multilingual environment characterises life at the LISA. Our pupils come from around the world and speak over 30 languages. Mutual respect and tolerance embedded in a high academic environment are the foundation of our excellent school community, to which also parents and alumni feel committed.

The LISA provides a stimulating, colourful and supportive educational experience for around 450 pupils aged 10 to 18. With English as the language of tuition and strong academic and interpersonal support, our pupils gain skills that will prepare them for an increasingly changing and global society. Our mission is to educate for life, establishing a global, open-minded, international, and academic outlook. We would like to open the gate to the world for our pupils!

The LISA was founded in 1992 and is one of the three branches of the Europagymnasium in Linz. Our school is a state-funded IB World school located in the northern part of the city, near Johannes Kepler University, next to the rolling green Austrian countryside. Through the Diploma Programme, which we have offered since 1997, we aim for our pupils to develop physically, intellectually, emotionally, and ethically. With the full IB Diploma, our pupils obtain a qualification highly recognised by universities worldwide. Most of our pupils also sit the standardised Austrian national final exams (Österreichische Reifeprüfung), allowing them to study at universities in and outside Austria. Small group sizes in the IB subject areas, experienced and highly motivated national and international teachers, and an encouraging learning environment have conducted an average pass rate of over 90% in the IB exams, which we are very proud of.

At the heart of our school and our success are the people that make it up. It is the energy, enthusiasm, and ingenuity of our staff that creates the experiences, opportunities, and unique atmosphere our pupils enjoy. Pupils, parents, and teachers constantly work together to improve and adapt to create a comfortable, safe, and rewarding academic environment.

On the **2**nd **floor**, you will find all special rooms for e.g. chemistry, physics, biology, visual arts and handy craft rooms.

The LISA classrooms are mainly located on the **3rd floor of the Europagymnasium Auhof**. On the 3rd floor you will also find the **LISA School Branch Coordination Office**, the **LISA Administration** (= office of the LISA Support Association), the **LISA Staffroom**, **the school doctor** and the **LISA Library**.

Libraries

The central library is located on the ground floor. It offers books and magazines in different languages, computers with internet access and the opportunity to borrow books for home study. Opening hours and library rules are posted at the library door.

The LISA library is situated on the third floor of the school. It offers textbooks as well as a fiction section for children, adolescents and adults, mostly in English. A section with books in other languages (e.g. French, Spanish and Italian) is being established. Taking out books is free of charge. Opening hours include Monday to Friday, 10.30 to 10.45. Book donations are greatly appreciated

School Doctor

There is a school doctor on the grounds during certain times posted at the office door on the third floor. Students who need to leave the school due to not feeling well or need to be excused from gym classes are expected to see the doctor first.

5. How to get to school

Free Transport for Schoolchildren, "Schülerfreifahrt"

The burden of parents whose children attend school is relieved because the Austrian government pays for most of the costs incurred for travel to school. Parents only have to pay a small contribution towards costs for the public transport season tickets.

Two requirements must be fulfilled for schoolchildren to use public transport nearly free of charge for the travel from their residence to school: **family allowance** must be received for the child, and the school must be state-run or have public status if it is a private school. Free use of public transport will be only granted for travel to domestic schools or schools close to the border. The family contributes a relatively small amount.

What kind of documents are necessary to issue a Free School Transportation Card?

- 1. Family allowance must be obtained by the parents.
- 2. The letter with a code for the application will be handed out by the homeroom teacher at the beginning of the academic year.
- 3. You need to register at www.shop.ooevv.at and order either a Schüler-Ticket (only for travelling from home to school) or a Jugendticket-Netz (valid on all routes in Upper Austria). You need to upload proof of family allowance and a passport photo of the child.
- 4. After paying, you will receive a provisional ticket via e-mail. Please print it, and your child must carry it with him/her.
- 5. The finished ticket will be sent by post! The child must carry the school transportation card when using public transportation.

Children who are not eligible for the free transportation card only receive a "Freizeitausweis" and can buy a monthly pass ("Monatskarte") provided by the regional transport board.

6. Family Allowance and Tax Credit for Children in Austria

Parents who are Austrian citizens are entitled to **family allowance** for their children until they come of age, regardless of their income, if their main (permanent) residence is in Austria and the child is also a permanent resident of Austria. The additional requirement for non-Austrian parents is that the parent and child are lawful residents of Austria under Sec. 8 and 9 of the Austrian Settlement and Residence Act. **Please note**: In cross-border cases within the EU, special rules for family benefits apply under European law! Family allowance may be granted for children from the time they come of age until they turn 24 if they are training for an occupation, in some exceptional cases up to 25 years of age, as well as for children doing volunteer work with a non-private organisation up to the age of 24. There is no entitlement to family allowance during periods of military or civilian service and for children for whom (ex-)spouses are obliged to pay maintenance.

The family allowance varies according to the age of the child... The total number of children is taken into account via supplements (=sibling supplement scale).

The **tax credit for children ("Kinderabsetzbetrag")**, which is transferred along with the family allowance, continues to be paid twelve times a year.

The application for family allowance has to be filed with the Tax Office in charge of the residential address of the family. The tax credit for children is transferred without requiring a separate application. It is not an allowance in the strict sense of the word but a fiscal measure that is paid out in cash to all parents entitled to family allowance as a kind of negative tax and is funded from the general budget.

7. Clothing

LISA has no dress code. The **students are obliged to wear house shoes** (slippers) in order to maintain cleanliness in the school building. This rule does not apply if the caretaker attaches the "green shoe" to the school entrance! Street shoes have to be deposited in the basement lockers. Lockers are allocated at the beginning of each school year. The students have to buy their own locks.

8. School Lunches

The cafeteria (Schulbuffet) on the ground floor (Mon-Fri, 7:30 am to 2 pm) offers a variety of sandwiches, salads, drinks and snacks. Hot lunches are available at 1 p.m. and can be ordered via the website https://mica-catering.at/home/

"Schulbuffet BSZ Auhof". Microwaves are available for students at the "Schülercafe", on the first and third floor.

9. After School Care (TABE)

There is After School Care at the Europagymnasium Auhof, which offers supervision for the children during afternoons. This includes supervision during lunch, assistance with homework preparation and free time guidance. The enrolment is valid for the whole school year, and there is the possibility to choose either the whole week or any specific day or days of the week (Mon-Thu 12:30-17:00; Fri 12:30-15:15). After School Care starts the second week of school and ends the second to last week of each academic year.

Since After School Care is a school-regulated and supervised programme, students are not permitted to leave earlier without prior written permission from a parent. Registration forms are distributed at the beginning of the school year. The forms need to be submitted to the homeroom teacher by the second school day.

Please Note: Withdrawal from the programme is only possible at the end of the first term and requires a written request before January 31st.

10. Digital Devices and IT lessons

All students of our lower classes will receive a digital device (tablet with pen). The equipment is procured centrally via Bundesbeschaffungs GmbH (BBG). It is important that the devices become the property of the students, but that the software is still maintained centrally by a company (MDM = Mobile Device Management). Parents or legal guardians have to bear a cost share of 25% of the device price. This device price will range between € 400 and € 600 with insurance and maintenance.

Parents in difficult financial income situations have the option of the cost share being waived. Information on this will follow at the beginning of school.

Students of the lower classes will attend IT lessons according to their timetable.

12. Attendance and Absences


School attendance is compulsory. Absences have to be excused by the parent via our online system **WebUntis.**

In case of longer illnesses (more than 3 days), the homeroom teacher needs to be informed by phone or email, and a doctor's note must be submitted.

In case any reasons other than illness lead to a longer absence than one day, please send an official request to the head of the school Ms Obermayr-Rauter.

If a student in Grades 9 - 12 (Year 5 - 8) is unexcused for 7 consecutive days, he/she will be deregistered from school without warning.

Please find below the translation of Section 45 of the Austrian School Law

School Absence

Section 45 summarized:

- (1) You can only miss classes for the following reasons:
- a) Valid excuses (Paragraphs 2 and 3),
- b) Authorized absence (Paragraph 4),
- c) Exemption from specific subjects (Section 11, Paragraph 6).
- (2) Valid excuses include:

student's illness; illness of household members that could spread to the student; temporary essential assistance required by parents or relatives; extraordinary life events; impassable routes or severe weather endangering health; maternity protection employment bans.

- (3) Notify the homeroom teacher or head of school promptly of any excuse, verbally or in writing, with reasons. A written notification may be required upon request. Medical certificates may be requested for prolonged or frequent illness.
- (4) Homeroom teachers can approve absences for up to **one day**; **and head of school** for longer periods with valid reasons. Student representation activities and temporary participation in other semester classes are valid reasons.
- (5) Unjustified absence of more than a week, five non-consecutive days, or 30 hours, and failure to provide information upon request within a week, results in deregistration. Re-enrollment requires principal approval if the absence is justified and non-notification was for valid reasons.
- (6) Compulsory education students follow § 9, § 22, Paragraph 3, and § 23 of the Compulsory Education Act 1985 instead.
- (7) All-day school care component absence reasons:
- a) Valid excuses (Paragraphs 2 and 3),
- b) Authorized absence by the school principal or care component head,
- c) Upon legal guardians' request for peripheral leisure hours.

In effect since June 21, 2018. Last updated on July 1, 2022.

14. Subjects

Subjects are compulsory and vary from grade to grade. Religious education is a compulsory subject, provided the student's denomination offers religious education at school. Students can opt out of religious education classes within the first week of the new school year. A form has to be signed by the parent/guardian. In the upper Grades 9 - 12 (Years 5 through 8), ethics is offered as an alternative subject to religious education. It is compulsory for all students who do not attend religious education class.

The school also offers non-compulsory subjects (Unverbindliche Übungen like soccer, basketball, typing, climbing, ...), which the students can choose at the beginning of the school year. Once chosen, attendance is compulsory. The report card will indicate that the student attended, but no grade is awarded.

15. The Austrian Matura and the IB Diploma

LISA is a university-preparatory general education school and we therefore offer the Austrian Matura (official term: AHS Reifeprüfung) to those students who speak German as a mother tongue, and who have taken a German mother tongue language course.

The Matura includes oral and written exams and a written report (Vorwissenschaftliche Arbeit, VWA).

Most LISA students complete both the Matura as well as the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IB DP). Both IB DP as well as the Matura enable students to continue their studies at universities and universities of applied sciences (Fachhochschulen, FHs).

The IB Diploma Programme is taught in the last two Years 7 and 8 (Grade 11 and 12). The IBDP is internationally recognized for university admission, including Austria. The IB Diploma (IBDP) is offered at the LISA in addition to the Matura.

Final Exams for the IB Diploma Programme

In case of a retake IB exam, the IB examination fees have to be paid again as they are prescribed by the IB Organisation.

LISA Academy Programme

The LISA Academy Programme is offered in the last two years of the school career. It is a programme for students who cannot complete the Austrian Matura due to German language skills. To cover the costs of this programme, a higher school membership fee is imposed. It is a two-year programme, and therefore it is not possible to enter the programme after the first IB year has started.



17. Non-regular and Regular Students, Grades and Report Cards

International students enter LISA as non-regular students. The status of a non-regular student is granted to students from abroad who can for some reason not fulfil the requirements in compulsory subjects. The school offers special courses ('crash courses') in order to allow these students to catch up. They are given a certain time to catch up with the rest of the class, and as soon as they have reached the level stated in the curriculum of the grade in question, their status will be transferred to that of a regular student. Non-regular students will receive a "Schulbesuchsbestätigung" = school enrolment confirmation with grades. This document is similar to a "Jahreszeugnis" = report card and has the same significance with regard to passing the school year.

Regular students are required to attend all mandatory subjects outlined in the Austrian curriculum and obtain passing grades in each of these subjects. If a student receives a failing grade in one or two of these subjects, they are given the opportunity to participate in make-up examinations (known as "Wiederholungsprüfungen") at the start of the first school week in September of the subsequent school year.

Upon the conclusion of the school year, there is a class-teacher conference that determines whether a student can progress to the next grade. This decision is based on the annual "Schulbesuchsbestätigung" (attendance certificate) or report card. If the report card displays a single failing mark ("Nicht genügend"), the student can usually advance to the next grade if they have performed well in all other subjects except the one where the failing mark was received. However, if the class conference does not grant permission for advancement with a single failing mark, the student is required to take an exam (Wiederholungsprüfung) specifically in the subject they did not pass (as mentioned earlier).

In case of **more than two negative marks**, the class has to be repeated, i.e. the student is not allowed to advance to the next higher class.

Students who fail to attend classes regularly cannot be assessed at all. According to Austrian regulations, the student can apply for examinations (Nachtragsprüfungen) to compensate for absences.

Grades

1 = sehr gut (excellent)

2 = gut (good)

3 = befriedigend (satisfactory)

4 = genügend (sufficient)

5 = ungenügend (insufficient = not pass)



The annual school report (Jahreszeugnis or Schulbesuchsbestätigung) is handed out at the end of every academic year. It is relevant for the advancement to the next higher class. At the end of the winter term, a 'semester' report (**Schulnachricht**) is issued in order to inform the parents of the achievement level of each student.

18. First Academic Language and "Mother Tongue"

At LISA every student is registered with a first academic language or "Mother Tongue". This is the **strongest academic language** of a student. Usually, the mother tongue language is also the strongest academic language. At LISA, when we speak of the "mother tongue" this is the first academic language of a student.

Example First Academic Language vs. Mother Tongue:

It could be that a student speaks e.g. Spanish as a mother tongue at home but has always been attending international school with English as an academic language. The student speaks Spanish but has little writing skills. In this case, we would consider English the first academic language and the student is registered with English as a "Mother Tongue" at LISA.

IB Information concerning language choice

All students who want to obtain the Austrian Matura are required to pass these subjects during Grades 9-12 (Years 5-8):

- German as a mother tongue
- English as a first foreign language
- Mathematics

The Ministry of Austria does not offer the Matura examination (to students with mother tongues other than German.

Students who have English or a different mother tongue (other than German) are able and allowed to complete the IB Diploma Programme. Attending both German and English mother tongue lessons at the same time is not possible as they take place at the same time.

All students with a mother tongue other than German are required to attend German as a foreign language course. This course also does not prepare them for the Austrian Matura exams.

Students who have a mother tongue other than German or English have two possibilities:

- They complete the mother tongue language programme at LISA. These students are also allowed to complete a "self-taught" language in the IB programme. While guidance is provided by the school for this IB course, it is recommended that the student obtain support from native teachers of their language. Please find more information about the mother tongue programme on our website: https://lisa.europagym.at/learning-languages/ In this case, students have the right to drop one of the additional language courses (F, Sp, L, It).
- They declare the better of the two languages (German or English) as their mother tongue and are then required to pass this course.

In any case, all international students with a different first academic language than German are required to attend German as a foreign language.

19. LISA Languages and LISA Economics The Academy Programme

Lower Classes LISA Languages or LISA Economics?

The students of Grade 6 (Year 2) will choose their courses in their area of interest at the end of the first semester of Grade 6 (Year 2). Then they will decide whether they will follow the Economics or Languages curriculum starting in Grade 7 (Year 3). The classes will only be split for the elective subjects. Thus the social structure of the classes will remain intact at least to the end of Grade 8(Year 4).

LISA Languages: Austrian 8-year grammar school programme with French starting in Year 3 and

Italian, Latin or Spanish in Year 5 (approximately conforms to a language grammar school (= neusprachliches Gymnasium), Drama starting in Year 1.

LISA Economics: Austrian 8-year grammar school programme with IT and Chemistry starting in

Grade 7 (Year 3) and French, Italian, Latin or Spanish as well as Economics from Grade 9 (Year 5) (equivalent to a wirtschaftskundliches Realgymnasium),

Drama starting in Grade 5 (Year 1).

Upper Classes

LISA Languages, LISA Economics or the Academy Programme?

Only candidates with German as a mother tongue are able to sit the Matura exams. Thus, a separation is necessary:

Students with German as a first academic language à Matura & IB Diploma

Programme Classes: LISA Languages & LISA

Economics

Students with a different first academic language than German à IB Diploma

Programme Classes: The Academy Programme

Pupils in the LISA Languages and LISA Economics branches will be prepared to sit both the Austrian Matura Exams and the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme final exams (IB DP exams).

Pupils in the Academy Programme branch are only being prepared for the IB Diploma exams.

Non-native German-speaking pupils starting at our school before Grade 11 (Year 7) will automatically be placed in the LISA Economics programme. Once they have been assigned to a class, they will be expected to take all subjects (until the end of Grade 10 (Year 6).

Students entering the school in the upper grades (Grades 9 – 11) will be placed in the LISA Academy Programme starting in Grade 11 (Year 7) because they are not qualified to sit the Austrian Matura exams. These pupils have to decide before entering Grade 11 (Year 7) which subjects they will choose for the IB Diploma Programme.

LISA Academy Programme

The LISA Academy Programme is for international pupils with a mother tongue other than German. Being able to master the English language in spoken and written form is necessary in order for the pupils to participate fully in the courses. Thus, pupils are able to prepare for higher education. They will have regular or non-regular student status and will receive either an official report card at the end of Grade 12/Year 8 (regular) or a certificate of attendance with grades in subjects taken (non-regular) and will graduate from the LISA with the IB Diploma.

In addition to the six subjects chosen for the IB Diploma, Academy Programme pupils have to attend the following classes: Physical Education, German as a Foreign Language, English as a mother tongue/Self Taught (IBO mother tongue programme) and assigned study hours. Their weekly school hours are approximately similar to those in the LISA Economics classes. Individual overbooking of courses is possible in accordance with the IB coordinator when choosing IB subjects in Grade 10 (Year 6). Due to administrative restrictions, changes will not be possible thereafter.

In order to apply to the LISA Academy Programme, placement tests and a placement interview are necessary. Depending on the results, you will be informed whether you have been accepted into the programme. Not being able to master German on a very high level (mother tongue) results in the inability to sit the Austrian National Exam (Matura). Being able to master English as a first or second language is necessary in order to follow courses.

Academic Achievements of international students and Academy-Students (Grades 11 and 12/Years 7 and 8)

- In order to successfully complete the school year, Academy students will have to attend all lessons in all chosen subjects. Absences not excused have to be compensated. More than 30 unexcused lessons will result in deregistration from school. Absences due to illness excused by a doctor's note will be accepted.
- International students (Grades 5-11/Year 1-7) have to achieve positive results in all subjects. Academy students (Grade 11 and 12/Year 7 and 8)) choose at least 6 IB Subjects, TOK and need to attend Sports, German as a foreign language and social studies/study hours. In case of a negative mark in one or two subjects, students have the opportunity to take make-up examinations (Wiederholungsprüfungen) at the beginning of the first school week in September of the following school year.
- Academy students of Grade 12/Year 8 will receive a "Schulbesuchsbestätigung" = enrolment certificate with grades or report card.
- Students who break the school rules will not be entitled to receive reference letters, or they will receive reference letters that reflect their performance. Those students are not entitled to any help concerning their application for university, e.g. how to write a motivation letter, university advice, etc.



School Fees

20. Financial Matters

Unlike other international schools, the LISA is publicly funded. In order to finance services that exceed the budget provided by the federal government of Austria, the LISA Support Association administers the annual membership fee.

The annual membership fee per school year:

- 600 € per student
- 500 € reduced rate for siblings

The annual membership fee for the Academy Programme per school year:

- 2400 € for the Grade 11/Year 7 Academy Programme
- 2400 € for the Grade 12/Year 8 Academy Programme

The Academy Programme fee includes items such as the basic subject IB and self-taught language exam fees, as well as the costs for a science study trip.

FAQ

- When and how do I have to pay? You will receive a payment request including bank transfer instructions, in October. The payment deadline is usually mid of November.
- Can I pay the annual membership fee in instalments? Yes. However, payment plans are only available
 upon individual request.
- What are the payment options for the Academy Programme fee? Full payment is either due in September/October or two instalments that can be made in September/October and Feb. Or, eight monthly instalments can be made Sept. through April (standing order via bank institute).

30. Education System in Austria

There are **nine years of compulsory education** in Austria, beginning at the age of six, children attend primary schools. Children of school age who are not ready for school are enrolled in the preparatory pre-school programme of primary schools. After four years of primary school education, for the first time, the system branches out to three types of general education schools, i.e.

- the new secondary school (Neue Mittelschule) and
- academic secondary school (Allgemein Bildende Höhere Schule ("Gymnasium"), e.g. LISA).

Upon completion of **secondary level I** (years 5-8), young people move on to **secondary level II** (years 9-12). They may choose between a total of four education pathways: level II academic secondary schools, secondary technical and vocational colleges (BHS), secondary technical and vocational schools (BMS), as well as a pre-vocational year (one-year course).

Young people who graduate from upper-level secondary courses providing general or vocational education and training may enrol in universities, universities of applied sciences, academies, and post-secondary colleges. Standard matriculation examinations (Reifeprüfung=Matura), entrance examinations (Studienberechtigungsprüfung) or vocational matriculation examinations (Berufsreifeprüfung) provide access to **tertiary-level education**. Those having completed vocational training may attend a school for master craftsmen/craftswomen or foremen/forewomen. Previous diploma courses have been gradually replaced by bachelor courses (six to eight semesters) followed by master courses (another two to four semesters). The formally highest post-graduate qualification is a PhD. In the field of education, law-making and law enforcement powers are shared by the Federal Government and the Länder (federal states). The Federal Ministry of Education, Arts and Culture (BMUKK) is the supreme supervisory authority for primary and secondary education, while the Federal Ministry of Science and Research (BMWF) is responsible for tertiary education.

The institutional framework and formal structure of the Austrian education system are illustrated on the next page.
